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1	MEMBER WALLACE: Second. Wallace.
2	CHAIR MOORE: It's been moved and seconded.
3	All those in favor?
4	(A chorus of "ayes" was heard.)
5	CHAIR MOORE: The motion passes.
6	Next, we'd like to have a Report on Legislation to
7	Develop Law-Enforcement Training to Address the Needs of
8	Persons with Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities.
9	MR. EVANS: Good morning. Two of the items are a
10	continuation of our discussion last session regarding
11	mental health. And we'll also do a brief discussion on
12	AB 25, Employment: Social Media.
13	And so the first item that I would like to discuss
14	is the Report on Legislation to Develop Law-Enforcement
15	Training to Address the Needs of Persons with
16	Developmental Disabilities. This is Senate Bill 663.
17	You know, existing law requires POST to design,
18	develop, and distribute law-enforcement training
19	applicable to persons with developmental disabilities and
20	mental illnesses.
21	Last year, Assembly Bill 602, which was authored by
22	Assemblymember Yamada, was signed by Governor Brown.
23	602, this bill, requires POST to develop, by
24	July $1^{\rm st}$, 2015, a training course on investigations of
25	abuse of residents of state mental hospitals and

1 developmental centers. 2 This bill also requires mandated reporters to 3 immediately report serious abuse of persons in state mental hospitals and developmental centers, to both local 4 5 law enforcement and state investigators. This brings us to our current agenda item. 6 7 Senate Bill 663 by Senator Lara would expand beyond 8 the reach of POST pertaining to training courses under 9 602. It expands our requirement to not just train those 10 individuals who are in the jurisdiction of the mental institutions; it now requests that we expand that 11 curriculum to all law-enforcement officers in California. 12 13 So the training will be DVD or electronic-based, and it will be a continuation of what we've been doing in 14 15 the past. Currently, POST has approximately five courses that's currently offered in this area of concern 16 involving mental health. 17 18 We haven't taken a position on the bill thus far, 19 wanting to discuss it first: If you would like to take a 20 position on the bill for or against. 21 MEMBER DUDLEY: Charles, would you mind giving us a 22 summary of those five courses? What do we presently have 23 available? 24 MR. EVANS: Currently, one course is Mental Health, 25 Decision-Making; Mental Health, Introduction; Mental

1	Illness Awareness, Refresher; Mentally Ill, Autism; and
2	the last one is Persons with Developmental Disabilities.
3	MEMBER DUDLEY: Is there anything that we don't
4	presently have, that these bills would be asking us to
5	create in terms of training?
6	MR. EVANS: No, I think there is no unmet training
7	need at this point. I think we're covering the bases
8	fairly well.
9	MEMBER DUDLEY: I'm sorry, say that again?
10	MR. EVANS: I think that we're meeting all of the
11	needs.
12	MR. STRESAK: Commissioner, we also have a training
13	mandate in the basic course that addresses this issue.
14	MR. EVANS: LD-37.
15	MR. STRESAK: Often, the crux is some of these
16	training mandates impose a finer level of granularity on
17	the officer to discern specific illnesses.
18	And our training has always focused on training
19	officers to recognize behavioral indicators and to steer
20	clear of diagnosis and other deeper causes.
21	And that's not to imply that 663 requires that.
22	However, we believe we have sufficient training resources
23	right now to cover that scope.
24	MEMBER DUDLEY: And, Charlie, can you tell me,
25	Senator Jackson contacted me, I contacted Bob, and I

believe you're in contact with Senator Jackson's office. 1 Senator Jackson also wants to author yet another piece of 2 3 legislation in this general area. Can you bring me up to speed on where you are with 4 your communications with that office and how, if at all, 5 this differs from what we're presently doing? 6 7 MR. EVANS: Yes, we've been working very closely 8 with the staff of Senator Jackson. 9 Senator Jackson's primary concern in the District 10 was the abuse -- sexual abuse of migrant workers. And 11 so we provided the center with our current course 12 offerings regarding that. 13 We don't have any curriculum specifically designed for that; but we did get -- and she was also interested 14 in curriculum on domestic violence, which we provided. 15 And we offer a course on domestic violence, domestic 16 violence with tribal communities. And so she was 17 18 satisfied with that aspect of it. 19 MEMBER DUDLEY: So migrant workers is compared to 20 mental health? Because she never mentioned that. MR. EVANS: Well, her -- she never mentioned mental 21 health. That was Lara -- Senator Lara whose concern was 22 23 mental health. 24 MEMBER DUDLEY: When Senator Jackson called me, it 25 was all about mental health. That was the concern she

1	had.
2	So that's not what she's communicated?
3	MR. EVANS: No, she's communicating sexual abuse of
4	migrant workers.
5	MEMBER DUDLEY: Okay, thank you.
6	MEMBER HUTCHENS: Charles, I'm assuming we've
7	communicated to Senator Lara that we already provide this
8	type of training?
9	MR. EVANS: Correct.
10	MEMBER HUTCHENS: And what was the response?
11	MR. EVANS: And I discussed that in the analysis of
12	the bill, in the first attachment.
13	Senator Lara's response was that, yes, we concur
14	that the bill that he is sponsoring is almost a mirror
15	bill image of the one that was presented by Yamada the
16	year prior. And he indicated that he wanted to go
17	forward, nevertheless, because he has a constituency to
18	satisfy.
19	I spoke with the Governor's office yesterday. They
20	are concerned that Senator Lara is proposing a bill that
21	has already been addressed in many ways by Assemblyman
22	Yamada.
23	MEMBER HUTCHENS: Thank you.
24	MR. EVANS: Okay, the second item, Report on
25	Proposed Legislation to Exempt POST from the

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Provisions --
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          MR. STRESAK: I think we need to take action on the

     first item.
          MR. EVANS: Correct. We must take action on that,
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     the one that we just discussed.
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          MR. STRESAK: If I could just reiterate real quickly
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     on 663, is that, number one, we believe it's not
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     cost-effective, given our current existing training
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     resources and our current fiscal condition.
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          Number two, that sufficient training resources and

     mandates already exist to cover this topic.
          And, number three, that it imposes additional cost
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13
     to local government.
          And those would be the three highlights of the bill.
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          MEMBER BUI: So are you asking for a position of

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1 CHAIR MOORE: Opposed? 2 (No response) 3 CHAIR MOORE: The motion passes. MR. STRESAK: Thank you, Mr. Chair. 4 5 MR. EVANS: Thank you. Item C, Report on Proposed Legislation to Exempt 6 7 POST on Provision from Government Code Section 19132. 8 Last session, we discussed the challenges that 9 POST were experiencing regarding its personal services 10 contracts. This is our attempt, actually, to exempt POST from those restrictive requirements in Government 11 Code section 19132 so that we won't have to go the 12 13 through the regular process to have our contracts 14 approved. 15 Last year, when we were working with Assemblyman Pan, he had attempted to exempt POST from the bill. But 16 17 in the gut process, that exemption was removed. They 18 just took the bill, and it went through and they 19 eliminated us. 20 He referred to that process as unintended 21 consequences for POST. So last year, he represented 22 another sponsor. He asked me who sponsored that bill. 23 This year, he's representing us. It would be a cleanup 24 bill process. And so he has agreed to support us in this 25 matter.

And so we're requesting that we be allowed to pursue 1 2 this legislation. 3 MR. STRESAK: So the motion would be to authorize the executive director to pursue legislation seeking 4 5 further amendment to 19130 of the Government Code. 6 MEMBER. DUDLEY: I so move. 7 MEMBER KURYLOWICZ: Second. 8 CHAIR MOORE: It's been moved and seconded. 9 All those in favor? 10 (A chorus of "ayes" was heard.) 11 CHAIR MOORE: The motion passes. MR. EVANS: The last item of interest for discussion 12 13 is with regards Assembly Bill 25 by Assemblymember Campos. Last year, Assemblymember Campos introduced 14 15 legislation that would have prevented law enforcement from conducting background investigations of its 16 17 applicants. Subsequent to that introduction, we were 18 working closely with her. She agreed to exempt law 19 enforcement, but it didn't happen. And so there was a 20 subsequent meeting of law-enforcement advocates. 21 about 40 law-enforcement advocates that met with members 22 from Campos' office. She didn't show up, but she sent 23 her legislative director, and members from the Governor's 24 office. 25 And the Governor set aside her determination to bar

1	law enforcement from looking at the backgrounds of
2	applicants.
3	So last week, we had another meeting. And the
4	Governor advised her again, reminded her that he was not
5	going to sign the bill unless she worked in good faith
6	with law-enforcement advocates. And that's where we are
7	now.
8	So that bill is still being considered.
9	So I think he is waiting for her to come around.
10	And so we'll see what happens.
11	That's the last item.
12	So, did you have a question?
13	CHAIR MOORE: No, do we have to make a motion on
14	that one?
15	MR. EVANS: No, that was just an update.
16	CHAIR MOORE: Okay.
17	MR. EVANS: There is no motion required on that one.
18	CHAIR MOORE: Okay, I see nothing else on the
19	agenda.
20	Is there anything else that we need to cover?
21	MR. STRESAK: There's nothing that I can recall.
22	Commissioners, do you have any comments or issues?
23	MEMBER DUDLEY: I would be interested if Charles has
24	some thoughts about where we are with the budget in terms
25	of the effect on law enforcement, just as you walk the

1	halls of the Capitol.
2	MR. EVANS: On budget?
3	Much of my interpretation of POST's budget, as I
4	walk the halls, is actually analyzed through the mind of
5	Bob Stresak. And so I'm going to defer to Bob Stresak.
6	MEMBER DUDLEY: I meant, about law enforcement and
7	the state in general.
8	MR. EVANS: Last year, the Legislature wasn't kind
9	to law enforcement. I don't think that they felt the
10	need to be because they had well-funded groups that they
11	were entertaining.
12	And so, of course, here at POST, we don't have the
13	ability to motivate a decision change through financial
14	incentive. All we have is our integrity. Other groups
15	have financial backing. So they weren't friendly toward
16	us because we didn't have anything to give them.
17	Now, that changes because as they need things from
18	us, of course, the dialogue changes.
19	Anything else?
20	MR. STRESAK: Anything else?
21	Mr. Chair, I'll turn it over to you to adjourn the
22	meeting.
23	CHAIR MOORE: Would anybody like to make a motion to
24	adjourn the meeting?
25	MEMBER HUTCHENS: Motion.
