I want to commend you on our professionalism.

Right outside our door is 36 holes of world-class golf. So you've got my utmost respect.

I appreciate the moment of silence. Two weeks ago today, we buried Officer Corder. And as all of you know, it's a police chief's worst nightmare to lose an officer. So I appreciate the gesture, and all the support I've received from chiefs and sheriffs from across the state; and really, from across the country, the support has been amazing.

I also want to commend you on your SAFE Driving
Campaign. The scene of our accident reminded me of the
video I just watched, that I think you helped sponsor,
Fifth and Wall with the LAPD crash, I think, from 1998.
Not quite the same facts, but the scene was very similar
to that.

And so we lose way too many officers in this state still to traffic collisions. And so I just appreciate and encourage you to continue to get that message out to help educate our officers and deputies, the risk of patrol and driving and the events that they're exposed to.

As you know, there are a lot of emerging issues still in the state of California. The criminal justice system continues to recalibrate itself. People are

talking about realignment. In my opinion, we're three years into realignment, and heading into the fourth year. The next challenge will be what appears to be the passage of Prop. 47 and the impact that's going to have on the criminal justice system.

I know here in Los Angeles County, some of the leaders are looking at the impact that's going to have. And that might change how we do business in this county, especially from a law-enforcement standpoint, as far as input and some of the things we're going to have to do. So I know that's polling well, and that's going to continue the pendulum shift in California. It's going to be a challenge, I think, for all of the law-enforcement leaders in this state.

I think as chiefs and executives, we have to do a better job educating our community as far as the 1033 program. I don't want to just to use the term militarization of law enforcement, but that equipment has been very necessary for some of the public-safety responsibilities that we have.

I think our challenge as law-enforcement leaders is, we have to do a better job of educating the public, the media, and our elected officials at the state and federal level. Otherwise, I think we're going to be dealing with some interesting legislation in the upcoming

year. And we need to get in front of that ship that's starting to sail already, and help shape the outcome of that to make sure that we keep that equipment. The real challenge is how that equipment is used. And I think all of us understand that.

All of you are aware, there is a national conversation still about body-worn cameras. It's almost an expectation now, but still the challenge is our data storage. And it appears that maybe only 30 percent of the departments that are deploying body-worn cameras actually have policies in place yet. So it's an emerging issue that, again, as leaders, we're going to have to deal with.

And I don't want to prioritize issues, but still the number one issue, I think, for us in Los Angeles County is the mental-health issue, and the mental-health issue for first responders having to deal with that population that's underserved in our county.

I know the District Attorney in the County is coming out with new protocols and a new program.

I anticipate the new sheriff of Los Angeles County is going to be a key player in that conversation. I look forward to that, without making any predictions for the election. But we're looking forward to new leadership in Los Angeles in the County Sheriff's Department, and we

wish Jim well. 1 I guess, I'd also I'd like to thank and recognize 2 Bob Stresak for his leadership throughout the state. 3 He has become a good friend for the last couple of years. 4 5 I've come to respect everything he does; and the way he represents your Commission throughout the state I think 6 7 is commendable. 8 So, Bob, a job well done. 9 So on behalf of, again, the Covina Police 10 Department, thank you for honoring Officer Corder, and 11 enjoy your meeting today. 12 Thank you for having me. 13 COMMISSION CHAIR HUTCHENS: Thank you. 14 (Applause) 15 COMMISSION CHAIR HUTCHENS: Thank you, Chief Raney, for your very pertinent comments. And you listed a 16 17 number of initiatives that the POST Commission has been 18 focused on. 19 I always wonder who I'm looking at, because if you 20 don't know, he has a twin brother that I work with in 21 Orange County who is the chief of the Garden Grove Police 22 Department. And it's very -- it's really bad when 23 they're both in the same room. They were both in the same room at a graduation, and I had to look at the 24

patches to know who I was talking to.

2	Okay, now, we have our 2013 POST Excellence in
3	Training Awards.
4	(2013 POST Excellence in Training Award Ceremony)
5	COMMISSION CHAIR HUTCHENS: Good morning, I am
6	Sandra Hutchens, Chair of the POST Commission.
7	Let me give the Executive Director time to get here.
8	Each year, the Commission recognizes individuals and
9	an organization that have greatly contributed to the
10	success and effectiveness of the law-enforcement
11	community.
12	On behalf of the entire Commission, it is my
13	pleasure to honor this year's recipients who have
14	distinguished themselves by demonstrating a commitment
15	to exceptional service or excellence in training.
16	Assisting me today in this ceremony is Jim Bock,
17	Chair of the Commission Advisory Committee, and Bob
18	Stresak, Executive Director of POST.
19	At this time, I would like to ask the award
20	recipients to come forward to be recognized.
21	(Recipients stepped forward for award ceremony)
22	COMMISSION CHAIR HUTCHENS: I apologize, it's not
23	Jim Bock, it's George Beitey.
24	I apologize, George.
25	The POST Excellence in Training award was

1	established in 1994 to encourage the innovation, quality,
2	and effectiveness of peace-officer training, and to
3	recognize the best of the best. The categories of the
4	POST Excellence in Training award are Individual
5	Achievement and Organizational Achievement. The
6	Commission is proud to offer these annual awards that
7	affirm California's national reputation of being in the
8	forefront of law-enforcement training.
9	This year, there were four nominees for two of the
10	award categories. The 15-member Commission Advisory
11	Committee reviewed all submissions; and after a rigorous
12	screening process, provided their recommendations to the
13	Commission for approval.
14	In addition to the trophies that will be given to
15	the recipients today, their names will be inscribed on a
16	perpetual plaque located at POST headquarters.
17	We begin with the individual achievement.
18	The recipient of the POST Excellence in Training
19	Individual Achievement Award for 2013 is Detective Edward
20	Nordskog, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, Arson
21	Explosives Detail.
22	(Applause)
23	MS. BULLARD: Edward Nordskog started his career
24	with the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department in May of 1986.
25	He has been assigned to the arson explosives detail for

the past 16 years, and a member of the Training Cadre for ten years. He's responsible for teaching Origin and Cause investigations, Arson Case Strategies, Arson Case Presentation, Courtroom Testimony, and Serial Arson Investigations.

Detective Nordskog also assisted in developing the POST Institute of Criminal Investigation, ICI, Arson and Explosive Investigation, and Homicide Fire Death Investigation courses, both of which he instructs. He is a recognized expert on serial arson investigations, and has been called on to lecture throughout the state to various law enforcement and fire departments as well as State Parole and Probation Department investigators.

This year, Detective Nordskog was asked to present to the National Police in South Africa and the National Police and Forensics Institute in Beijing.

Detective Nordskog has been credited with bringing about a paradigm shift in the field of serial arson investigations. He has debunked previous myths and methodologies and provided investigators with a commonsense, practical approach to conducting these types of investigations.

He has conducted over 1,700 fire investigations and taught over 500 arson investigators, and is recognized as a certified fire investigator by the California State

1	Fire Marshal.
2	In 2012, Detective Nordskog was named the California
3	Peace Officer Standards and Training "Investigative
4	Instructor of the Year."
5	For these reasons, Detective Edward M. Nordskog is
6	the winner of the 2013 POST Excellence in Training Award
7	for Individual Achievement.
8	(Applause)

11	MR. NORDSKOG: I have about an hour, so I don't have
12	to be back at work for about an hour.
13	No, just a quick comment.
14	I realize for a lot of you, arsons explosives is a
15	very niche field, and it doesn't affect you.
16	Actually, you have fire deaths in every community.
17	You have serial arsonists in every community. They just
18	don't make the headlines. My units looked at 20 of them
19	in the last two years.
20	So when we instruct we're usually instructing
21	firefighters, but if you know anything about the arson
22	world, the fire departments are dumping their arson units
23	and giving it all back to the police. It's statewide,
24	it's nationwide, it's international.
25	So State POST is ahead of the game already. They

1	have a unit in place, or training in place, and we're
2	going to go forward with more.
3	Thank you.

5	COMMISSION CHAIR HUTCHENS: Thank you.
6	The recipient of the POST Excellence in Training
7	Organization Achievement Award for 2013, is the
8	California Highway Patrol Below 100 Campaign.
9	Accepting the award on behalf of the California
10	Highway Patrol is Chief Scott Howland.
11	(Applause)
12	MS. BULLARD: The national Below 100 Campaign was
13	developed and implemented in 2011 by Dale Stockton,
14	editor-in-chief of Law Enforcement Magazine, and Captain
15	Travis Yates, Tulsa, Oklahoma, Police Department.
16	The mission of the Below 100 campaign is to reduce
17	the number of law-enforcement officers killed in the
18	line of duty on an annual basis to a number less than
19	100.
20	It is based on five tenets:
21	Wear your seatbelt.
22	Wear your vest.
23	Watch your speed.
24	Win what's important now, and
25	Remember: Complacency kills.

In 2012, the California Highway Patrol adopted the mission of the Below 100 national campaign, and developed and enhanced the curriculum to present statewide to all CHP officers and allied agencies.

To accomplish this massive undertaking, the CHP developed a Below 100 train-the-trainer course that was presented March 2013.

With a cadre of 38 trained instructors, the process began to decrease officer in-line-of-duty deaths.

The CHP produced striking videos that make an emotional connection to the audience. The curriculum covers issues not necessarily addressed in manuals or in policies, but goes to the core of internal attitudes and beliefs.

The course promotes a culture of safety through the CHP and other law-enforcement agencies, making it everybody's responsibility to watch out and to speak out to save lives.

Over 5,100 CHP personnel and 460 allied agency personnel have completed the CHP Below 100 training. The evaluations frequently include comments from students, indicating they have changed their own behaviors and are more willing to speak out to help others change theirs.

But it is not just the students that have been

1	impacted by this training. Following the CHP social
2	media site, many spouses and family members have
3	expressed their appreciation for the training that is
4	designed to help bring their loved ones home after
5	every shift.
6	This course has reduced liability, it's increased
7	accountability, and improved safety for law-enforcement
8	personnel and our communities.
9	For these reasons, the California Highway Patrol
10	Below 100 Campaign is the winner of the 2013 POST
11	Excellence in Training Award for Organizational
12	Achievement.
13	(Applause)
14	(Photograph taken of Beitey, Howland, Stresak,
15	and Hutchens.)
16	CHIEF HOWLAND: We are humbled and honored to get
17	this award. And I think based on even our conversations
18	and discussion earlier this morning, it's really about
19	what the award represents, and that's trying to save the
20	lives of our personnel out in the field every day.
21	And I know every member of the Commission, as well
22	as every leader of law enforcement across the state of
23	California and across the nation, their biggest concern
24	is, they want their personnel to come home safely.
25	And to have the concept and a simple thing of

control what we can control, because it's a dangerous job, and get our folks home safe.

And I'd be remiss if I didn't thank Dale Stockton for his brainchild and his inspiration for this program, and Dale's assistance with training our instructors with this.

And I also wanted to thank Brent Newman and Captain
John Arrabit who are here today. They were an integral
part of this program, along with Steve West and Paul
Benton who were really kind of a core. But it's really
those 38 instructors who hit the home run. And they
connected with our officers and really got them to think.

And we heard about the feedback we got; but when you hear from officers with less than a year on and you hear from officers with 30 years on that said "The training made me think and change my actions to ensure that I got home safely every day," we know we hit a chord, and we know it worked.

We're excited about the lives that we've saved,
we're excited about the lives that we're going to save
in the future, and we're excited about expanding this
program and making sure we share it with as many
personnel as possible, to make sure they do everything in
their control to save their lives.

Again, thank you. We appreciate the award.

          FINANCE CHAIR/COMMISSIONER MOIR: Thank you,
     Madam Chair.

          I'm Sylvia Moir, chair of the Finance Committee.
```

1	And I am presenting on behalf of all of the committee
2	members and on behalf of POST staff, who does an
3	extraordinary job in preparing the financials for us to
4	review.
5	We met yesterday, Wednesday, October $22^{ m nd}$ ; and we
6	had a conversation and discussion regarding the following
7	items:
8	We did report on revenues for fiscal year 2013-14.
9	We reviewed the report covering that period. And
10	there were several attachments, in several areas, that
11	were highlighted by POST staff.
12	Some of note for the general conversation, actually
13	here, and presentation to this committee:
14	Overall revenues were down 5 percent from the last
15	fiscal year from the Penalty Assessment Fund. That is
16	not a surprise, but it was a report.
17	And the total revenue from the Penalty Assessment
18	Fund totaled \$29.5 million.
19	POST received \$14 million from the Driver Training
20	Penalty Assessment Fund. And POST's other sources of
21	revenue saw a \$400,000 increase due to interest that
22	POST received on the well-known and reported \$5 million
23	loan that POST made to the State of California.
24	Other sources of revenue totaled \$849,000. And
25	we noted the cumulative revenue totals were down

1 2.51 percent. 2 Fiscal year 2012-13 revenue totaled \$44.5 million, 3 and FY 2013-14 totaled \$44.3 million. 4 We had a report on expenditures for fiscal year 2013 and 2014, and we spent \$53.6 million for fiscal year 5 2013-14, ending with a remaining balance of \$6 million, 6 7 which is 10 percent of the Commission's total allocated 8 budget. 9 Moving on to reimbursements. POST reimbursed 10 agencies \$15.1 million for reimbursable training from July 1, 2013, to June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2014. For the same period 11 12 the last fiscal year, \$19.6 million was reimbursed. 13 This resulted in an overall reduction of 23 percent. This savings is largely attributed to the Expenditure 14 Reduction Plan that began in January of 2014. 15 We reduced contract expenditures by \$8.7 million 16 17 for the current fiscal year; and administrative contracts 18 totaled \$1.05 million, and expenditures as of June 30<sup>th</sup> 19 totaled \$786,000. And that results in 77 percent 20 expended. 21 Training contracts totaled \$21.9 million. 22 And I'm sure you're all keeping this math at the 23 forefront of your mind, and checking this math as I 24 present it.

So training contracts totaled \$21.9 million as of

25

1	June $30^{th}$ . And it's 61 percent of expenditures.
2	So a quick report on the enacted budget for fiscal
3	year 2014-15:
4	POST is projecting to expend \$56.9 million for
5	fiscal year 2014-15. Beginning balance or reserves for
6	fiscal year 2014-15 increased from the original
7	projections, which is very, very good news. And it
8	resulted in a change from \$11.1 million in reserves, to
9	\$17.1 million.
10	Staff received a request to augment the Strategic
11	Plan interagency agreement for fiscal years 2014-15.
12	And staff also asked to augment that agreement with the
13	California State University Sacramento Center for
14	Collaborative Policy, CCP, for completing the Strategic
15	Plan, resulting in an update of the POST Strategic Plan
16	in an amount not to exceed \$42,000.
17	Through our conversation and an excellent
18	presentation by Jan Bullard, the Finance Committee is
19	recommending that the Commission approve this contract
20	augmentation.
21	Madam Chair, this concludes my presentation of the
22	highlights from the Finance Committee meeting.
23	COMMISSION CHAIR HUTCHENS: Thank you.
24	Any questions?
25	COMMISSIONER MELEKIAN: Madam Chair?

1	COMMISSION CHAIR HUTCHENS: Yes?
2	COMMISSIONER MELEKIAN: No questions. But it would,
3	I think, be helpful, if it wouldn't be too much of a
4	burden on staff to have perhaps kind of a one-page recap
5	that we might look at when this report is presented.
6	I have to confess, I couldn't follow all the
7	numbers. And it would be I think it's important,
8	particularly if we continually have struggles around
9	budget issues.
10	COMMISSION CHAIR HUTCHENS: Do we have a report that
11	exists, or can we provide that?
12	FINANCE CHAIR/COMMISSIONER MOIR: We do.
13	I would ask, would you like that report in the
14	graphic presentation one-page summary?
15	COMMISSIONER MELEKIAN: Whatever the simplest
16	thing whatever the simplest format would be. It
17	doesn't have to be in a lot of detail; just some of I
18	mean, your number recap is very helpful. It would just
19	be nice to look at.
20	FINANCE CHAIR/COMMISSIONER MOIR: And Ms. Dudley
21	kept up on the math very accurately.
22	But I agree, there's a lot of numbers that we throw
23	at you. And I will speak with staff about that. They
24	do an extraordinary job at preparing myself and the
25	Finance Committee. So we will do that in the future.

1	We appreciate that.
2	COMMISSION CHAIR HUTCHENS: That's a great idea.
3	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR STRESAK: We'll be able to
4	provide that.
5	COMMISSIONER DUDLEY: Barney, would you like it to
6	have been posted while she was going through it, up on
7	the screen?
8	COMMISSIONER MELEKIAN: That would have been nice.
9	That might be better, in lieu of more paper.
10	FINANCE CHAIR/COMMISSIONER MOIR: We will have that,
11	moving forward; and I appreciate the suggestion.
12	COMMISSIONER LOWENBERG: Madam Chair, might I
13	suggest and remind all of our fellow commissioners that
14	Commissioner Melekian spent four years in Washington,
15	D.C., as director of COPS. So his ability to understand
16	budgets is probably a little handicapped, so
17	COMMISSION CHAIR HUTCHENS: So noted.

25	where the participants are going to be able to develop

the goals and objectives for the organization. It's extremely important that we have a comprehensive representation of all of our stakeholders; so we are proposing to the Commission, to approve that the Advisory Committee, in total, be allowed to participate in the Strategic Planning workshop.

We would also suggest that in the event that one of the members cannot attend, they would be able to designate someone to participate on their behalf, representing their association or their agency.

We are also going to ask the chair if she would appoint up to three members of the Commission who would also participate in this workshop.

Now, we do have one modification to this agenda item that you do not have in your binder, and that's that we are going to be changing the proposed date, which was November 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup>, for this workshop, back to sometime in mid-January. And the reason is, this is going to give us an opportunity to potentially do one more internal meeting where we will be able to develop some goals and objectives pertaining strictly to our internal operation and our staff. Plus, we felt that it would really give Advisory and Commission a little bit more time to actually schedule and be able to attend the workshop.

          Bureau Chief Loggins discussed the new EMSA
23
     requirements and the training fiscal impact that the
     new regulations could have on law enforcement from the
24

     academy through the advanced officer training levels.
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Committee Member Joe Flannagan provided insight on a possible cost-saving solution, involving using certified trainers from the Army National Guard.

And Committee Member Lindstrom thanked POST for getting the regulation reduced and delayed, citing the difficulty in cost implementation of the regulation.

We had a couple of presentations, one from

Dr. Shelley Spilberg. She provided a brief, yet thorough

presentation on the new psychological screening manual,

which entailed a tremendous amount of research and work.

And the project is going to be -- the value of it is

going to be immeasurable.

Bureau Chief Colin O'Keefe provided a presentation on the current short-term and long-term technological implementations of POST. And as part of that presentation, Bob Lapanja provided the statistical probabilities of him being placed in a hotel room with a binary number. He also discussed the new online certificate program that he is currently working on.

We had our elections for the new Advisory chair and vice chair.

And it's my honor to congratulate California

Community College representative George Beitey as being elected for the chair, and CCLEA representative Mario

Casas as the vice chair.

1	Advisory Member Joe Flannagan also provided an
2	amazing resignation speech, thanking POST for being a
3	part of his life and improving the quality of
4	peace-officer training throughout the state of
5	California.
6	That's all.
7	COMMISSION CHAIR HUTCHENS: Thank you for your
8	report.
9	And Commissioner Wallace, the Legislative Review
10	Committee report?
11	He's not here.
12	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR STRESAK: Commissioner Moore.

15	LEG. REVIEW CHAIR/COMMISSIONER MOORE: Gentlemen,
16	I'm Jethroe Moore, chair of the Legislative Committee.
17	And our meeting primarily this morning was
18	Ms. Blaylock, if you would come forward, please.
19	Our meeting was primarily for informational
20	purposes. The only thing that really came up I'll
21	let Ms. Blaylock bring it up would be under AB 25,
22	the decision was to take no action at this time.
23	Ms. Blaylock?
24	MS. BLAYLOCK: Yes, good morning, Madam Chair and
25	Members of the Commission.

AB 25 was legislation that was sought by Assembly 1 2 Member Campos regarding social media. And the bill was 3 seeking an exception for law enforcement to access social media in the hiring process. 4 5 That bill has died. And at this time, I do believe that we're not going to take any action on that at this 6 7 time. 8 There are some other items I would like to bring to 9 the attention of the Commission. 10 We reviewed 13 legislative items. Of most significant note for POST is that AB 2387 11 by Assembly Member Pan, regarding public contracts was 12 13 passed. And what that means for POST is that POST will no longer have to notify organizations that represent 14 state employees for their contracts. And POST will not 15 be required to obtain three competitive bids for their 16 contracts. This will expedite the process for us in 17 implementing contracts for training. 18 19 Also two more bills of note that I would like to bring to the attention: 20 SB 505 by Senator Jackson regarding peace officers 21 welfare checks and firearms. 22 23 The bill requires every law-enforcement agency to

develop, adopt, and implement written policies and standard protocols pertaining to the best manner to

24

25

conduct welfare checks when motivated by the concern that a person may be a danger to himself or others.

This will be something that each individual agency or area will develop on their own.

At this time, we're not seeking a standard protocol. However, that is something that we will look into, to see if that is possible.

Also SB 850 by Senator Block is the public post-secondary education community college districts.

This bill authorizes a pilot program that will include 15 college districts -- community-college districts.

Each district will be authorized to offer one baccalaureate program in the community colleges on one of the campuses per -- one of the campuses for each of the 15 districts.

And the highlight of the pilot program is that it will address unmet workforce needs that are not offered by the four-year universities. And those will include health, biotechnology, public safety, and, quote, "other needed fields, as identified."

The program will last from academic year 2017-18 until 2022-2023. And those participating in the program must complete the baccalaureate program no later than the 2022-2023 date.

And those were the highlights from the Legislative
