Sheriffs' Association, I want to express a warm welcome 1 2 to everyone in attendance at today's POST Commission 3 meeting. 4 As you all know, POST was established in 1959 to 5 set minimum selection and training standards for California law enforcement. POST holds a crucial role 6 7 in the development of our police employees, both sworn 8 and professional staff. 9 Thoughtful training is what makes a good department 10 great. 11 As I thought about speaking to you today, I had the 12 opportunity to reflect on the impact that POST has had on 13 my career. I am the product of several very progressive chiefs 14 15 who understood the need to educate and professionalize the profession. 16 17 As a young sergeant, I thought I knew it all. 18 very frustrated that I was being sent to SLI. 19 myself why I had to fly to San Diego once a month. 20 I understand. It's training such as SLI, Command 21 College, and all the other courses offered, that gave me 22 the knowledge, expertise which helped me move through the 23 ranks. 24 Now, as a police chief, I recognize the important 25 role each member of POST plays. The hard work of the

| 4  | I also get to enjoy watching young officers' careers      |

STRESAK: 6 Thank you. 7 And, once again, congratulations to all of you. And 8 thank you for your commitment to be here. 9 Next, I'd like to send our best wishes to Assistant 10 Executive Director Dick Reed. Dick will be retiring in 11 a few days, off to claim his god-given right to retire, 12 to exercise his grandfatherly skills, and to challenge 13 the intelligence of fish. 14 Where are you, Dick? 15 It is widely known that many a fish fear Dick. 16 perhaps for him also to wake up each weekday morning and 17 face each Sunday night knowing that he was nowhere to 18 go -- except where he wants to. | 5  | and give the report as he did so eloquently yesterday.    |
| 6  | Dick Reed, if you would come up, I'd appreciate it.       |
| 7  | MR. REED: Commissioner Sobek is being modest.             |
| 8  | There is no one more eloquent than him. We all know       |
| 9  | this.   |
| 10 | Are we done with that now?                                |
| 11 | COMMISSIONER SOBEK: My chief is here, so be               |
| 12 | careful.  |
| 13 | MR. REED: Okay, we did have our meeting yesterday.        |
| 14 | Most of the information was relatively pro forma.         |
| 15 | The bottom line: We reviewed last year's financial        |
| 16 | report, which shows that our revenues are slightly down   |
| 17 | again.  |
| 18 | Just so you will know, we have slid from about            |
| 19 | \$41 million in our reserve, down to having about         |
| 20 | \$5 million by the end of this year.                      |
| 21 | Our revenues have slipped to \$30 million a year.         |
| 22 | There is a form that I'll point you to a chart on that in |
| 23 | just a minute.  |
| 24 | So last year, our revenues were down and our              |
| 25 | trainees were up by about 11,000 more than what we had    |

That's probably a consequence of the fact 1 projected. 2 that a couple of years ago, this Commission approved 3 increasing reimbursement, and reinstated backfill, which made it more capable for agencies to send people to 5 training. And we did that, of course, when we had money. And our revenues have continued to decline, however. 6 7 So we'll talk about that when we get to Item 7. 8 So last year, revenues were down and trainees were 9 up, and reimbursement was about \$6 million more than what 10 we had intended to spend. 11 We reviewed the contracts that we entered into 12 last year. We entered into about \$18 million worth of 13 training contracts that this Commission approved. 14 Of that amount, we only actually spent about \$12 million. 15 \$5 million of the remaining \$6.5 million is basically 16 unencumbered. We approved contract presentations that 17 did not get presented. So we're in the process of 18 disencumbering about \$5 million of the leftover funds, 19 so that we can roll that to our reserve for last year, 20 which will then, of course, accrue to this year's, and 21 will help the deficit situation that we'll talk about in 22 just a minute. 23 The next item we discussed was our expenditures for 24 all of last year. Let me turn to that report really 25 quickly. It's Tab 4.

Last year, we were allowed -- allocated \$58,877,000 1 2 by the Governor's office. Of that amount, we expended a 3 total of \$56,423,000 and some change. And we ended up with a reserve of approximately \$2.4 million. 4 That was 5 our balance at the end of the year. And we'll go to the financial report for the first 6 7 guarter of 2013-14. For the first quarter that ended September 30<sup>th</sup> --8 9 remember, our revenues are down, so we're interested in 10 saving money. But, actually, in fact, our revenues 11 declined 6.25 percent from what we received last year at 12 this point. Last year, we had received \$8.1 million at 13 this point; and this year, we have received only 14 \$7.6 million for the first three months. That's a 15 6.25 percent decline in our revenues. 16 Then when we compare that against our trainees, last 17 year at this time, we had reimbursed 9,279 trainees. 18 This year, we had reimbursed only 8,899, which is, of 19 course, a decline in the number by about 500 trainees; 20 however, the reimbursement went up by \$417,000. So we 21 increased from \$3,989,000 to \$4,406,000. 22 So at the same time, our number of trainees is going 23 down -- which is the right direction that we need to 24 go -- the amount of reimbursement went up. And we see

the reason for that, if you look at the chart down below.

25

Agencies did not go to the most cost-efficient training 1 2 to the same extent they did, receiving commuter 3 subsistence and commuter travel was down from the previous year. But everything else that really cost the 4 5 big bucks, like subsistence and resident travel, tuition, and backfill, was up from the year before. 6 7 So that's a trend that we've started for the first 8 quarter of this year that we need to reverse effective 9 January 1st, which we'll talk about again in just a 10 second. 11 So that's the first quarter report. 12 And we'll talk about expenditure projections for 13 2013-14. Again, this year, we're authorized \$59,447,000. 14 And our projections for this year are for us to spend 15 \$53,725,000. We're trying to wind down a little bit in 16 the hopes of getting a running start on adjusting to the 17 shortfall that's projected by Finance. 18 And also, the Finance Committee yesterday heard 19 two new expenditure items. Item F, which was the LEDS 20 instructor training, and that was a \$61,150 item. 21 Item G was a report on the contract for additional AICC 22 presentations. That's for \$207,148. The AICC -- I beg 23 your pardon. That's for \$145,998. 24 That money had been approved, actually, for a 25 critical-thinking program that we had hoped to present

through Oakland Police Department. This Commission approved that, I believe it was the last meeting, if not the one before.

However, they've opted not to do that. They effectively returned the money to us. So this is a request for us to use that money instead, to increase the training that we want to give to our academy instructors.

So, in a way, you'll be voting on this same expenditure twice; but because we're changing presenters, the Commission needs to rule on that. And the Advisory Committee did, in fact, approve that recommendation -- both of those -- yesterday.

Going to Number 7, which is the one that has been on most people's minds for some time. At the last meeting, I believe that we briefed the Commission that we were anticipating, with the Department of Finance, a \$5 million shortfall in the 2014-15 budget. And as we explained last time, Department of Finance cannot present an unbalanced budget to the Governor. They're working on that budget as we speak.

So it became necessary for us to decide how we were going to balance at the end of 2014-15. So we set about studying the issue. And one of the first things that we found was the Department of Finance was wrong. It's not \$5 million. It is actually about \$7.8 million. And

now, for a change, they're agreeing with our number --1 2 though we wish we could work with theirs instead. 3 Anyway, so our target for the deficit is \$7.8 million. 4 Subsequently, staff had several meetings. And we have 5 identified about ten different ways that we could save this money. And of those ways, we narrowed it down to 6 7 four potential solutions. Attachment A -- if you can bring that up for us --8 9 is actually a spreadsheet that will show why we are where 10 we are. This is a financial spreadsheet that shows how 11 our revenues have gone and our expenditures since 2004-05. 12 13 I'll direct you down to the total revenue picture. 14 Starting in 2004, you see there's a number -- are 15 we able to bring that up? I'll see if we can get it on the screen for you real 16 17 quick. Hold on. 18 If it's okay, Mr. Chair, I'll continue explaining 19 the chart; and we'll see if we can get it up. 20 CHAIR KURYLOWICZ: Okay. 21 MR. REED: The bottom line is, our revenues declined 22 from a high of \$42,105,000 in 2006-07, and started to 23 decline in 2009-10, down to \$38 million, then down to 24 36, then down to 30, and 31; and to where we are today, 25 at \$30,626,000. And the Department of Finance is

projecting that we're going to remain in the \$30 million 1 2 range through 2016-17. And, of course, you just noticed 3 that our expenditure authority is \$59 million. not getting as much revenue as what we're being allowed 4 5 to spend. Even if you add the 2410 account, we still are not getting enough money to sustain a reasonable reserve. 6 7 And then our fund balance, or what we call our 8 "reserve," has slipped from a high of \$31 million in 9 2007, and then it slipped down to 30, 32, 21, 20, 25, 16. And at the end of this year, they project it to be 10 11 \$5,997,000. 12 As you recall, that's far less than we're used to 13 seeing our reserve. And we love to have extra money in 14 the reserve because stuff always happens in the middle of 15 the year that the Commission wants to do. So we always 16 try to have a little bit in the hole, so that you've got 17 some discretionary money to work with. 18 The bad news is, however, that if we continue on 19 this path, we would end up with a \$7.8 million deficit 20 next year -- there we go. 21 So we're looking at the red numbers at the very 22 bottom right-hand corner. 23 And then exponentially, this problem compounds on 24 itself, to where Finance says that if we continue 25 unabated, then we would go to a \$22 million deficit in

2015-16, and a \$37 million deficit in 2016-17. And, of course, you all know that that cannot happen because we don't have any bail-out source. We have to live within our budget. And Finance then became very interested in what we were going to do to work our way out of this situation.

The salvation to this situation is actually for our revenues to increase. But you'll see on this chart that it took about five years for them to slip to the \$30 million range. So once the economy does start catching up with our revenues, or our revenues catch up with the economy, most of you at local government have started to recover already. But we haven't seen it at the state level just yet.

You felt it first, and then it hit us. Now, you're feeling the recovery first, and it will be a while before we catch up, is kind of the way it works.

Anyway, so I would speculate from what we studied, that if it does start to recover and monies do come back, it may be three or four years before it gets back to the \$40 million range that we're used to.

So we're going to try and put our finger in the dike here and stop the flow of negative cash. And that takes us to the agenda item that we had to develop for this.

And on the second page of that, if we can go to the

top of the second page.

We had two problems to resolve. First, we had to come up with a solution to tell Finance how we're going to solve this problem; and then we had to identify a range of alternatives. So in other words, we had to get \$7.8 million off of our ledger for 2014-15. And then we had to identify which programs we were going to impact to the tune of \$7.8 million.

So I will add that Department of Finance was pushing a deadline to get their reports done, so that they can report to their principals and to the Legislature on what POST is doing to solve the problem. And they're preparing that report as we speak.

So the question has been asked, did the Commission approve this agenda item? And the answer is, no, you did not. We briefed you last time. But because we had to get Finance some answers before the Commission met, we developed this plan.

So we told them basically how we thought we were going to save the \$7.8 million.

And then, of course, impacting which programs we're going to impact, we make recommendations herein.

Down below, Items 1 through 4 that you're looking at right there, these can all be changed. These are recommendations from staff. These are the things that

we selected. And we based our decision to go in this direction and make this recommendation based on the fact that we did not want to do anything that impacted high-liability courses or officer safety courses; and we didn't want to do anything that had the effect of damaging legacy courses or high-demand courses that are deemed to be most valuable to the field.

So the first thing that we decided, the low-hanging fruit for me, as your budgeteer here, for a long time was backfill reimbursement. Backfill is about a \$2 million-a-year piece for us. This year, we actually -- or last year, we actually spent a little bit more. But we'll save \$2 million a year. So we're recommending that reduction for 18 months. And that gets us \$3 million.

Nobody likes that. The field loves backfill. And we actually went out of our way to get one of the prior administrations to give this money to us, the 2410 money for backfill. That was one of the things we wanted to do. So we value that with the field. And we don't like doing this, but it is a way of us jump-starting this savings that we need to get.

The second thing that we recommend was that we begin suspending contracts -- or cap contracts for non-mandated courses. As I said before, we have about \$5 million

worth of contract money that was not spent last year. 1 2 So we want to cap all of our contracts at that 3 expenditure level. And that will get us another 4 \$6 million over 18 months by just the Executive Director 5 telling all of our presenters that you can do the same thing you did last year, you just can't do more of it. 6 7 So we're going to try and conserve that way. 8 And then we decided that suspending Plan IV 9 reimbursements for everything except contract or mandated training. This would be most of the community college 10 11 courses that you send your folks to. And these are 12 courses for which most of you, most of the time, would 13 receive commuter lunch, perhaps some lodging if you send 14 somebody out of town, and some travel. It's kind of a 15 de minimis thing on an individual basis, but we have 16 4,500 certified courses, of which about 3,800 are these Plan IV courses. 17 18 So that's what most of your staff will go to if 19 they're not supervisory or specialty assignment people, 20 the Advanced Officer Training, as we used to call it. 21 So we think that, cumulatively, we'll save another 22 \$4 million doing that. 23 And the last item that we've recommended is the 24 symposium and workshops that we do. Some of these are 25 really necessary. Just so you'll know, if you're working

your calculator on this, that's a \$1.7 million ticket 1 2 item for us each year. We know that some of those will 3 have to be presented. But basically, we wanted to suspend those and allow the Executive Director to be 4 5 deciding which ones absolutely need to go. In some cases, POST is ordered to do some of these, as some of 6 7 you'll recall. And in other cases, high-liability 8 courses need to be updated. So we're assuming that we 9 can reduce about two-thirds of those for just a one-year 10 period. 11 You'll notice, this is the only one that we've recommended suspending only from July 1st of 2014, to 12 June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2015. There's a typo at the bottom there. 13 14 That should have been changed to "15," I'm sorry. 15 So we're hoping to just save \$500,000 out of a 16 \$1.7 million total package. And that includes letters 17 of agreement and all the costs that go with developing 18 curriculum or presenting chiefs workshops and those sorts 19 of things. 20 So that's kind of our plan. And if everything that 21 we've projected comes true, we'll save \$13.5 million. 22 And remember the target from Finance, as far as they were 23 concerned at the time, was \$7,824,000. 24 What they didn't know at the time, but they do know 25 now -- because as we've sharpened the pencil, we've also

STRESAK: Thank you, Commissioner, for that 5 question. 6 7 The first point I want to make is that in 8 formulating this strategy, it's important for everybody 9 to realize that we had to comply with the Department of 10 Finance calendar, much like -- as they are preparing 11 for the January budget, they had deadlines that they held 12 us to. 13 So to answer your question directly, we looked at 14 a series of other viable options. We had quite a 15 smorgasbord at the table. And the issue ultimately 16 became which Peter do we rob from to pay Paul. And so we tried to look at this as fairly and as equitably as 17 18 possible to come up with these options. 19 Dick, would you like to expand on that at all? 20 MR. REED: Certainly. 21 Yes, Commissioner. We had, roughly, once we 22 sorted out the minutiae, we had about ten different 23 alternatives. And I actually had the ones we opted not 24 to go with, articulated in our report. But we decided, 25 number one, that would make the report too long, because

we'd get into the pros and cons of each one that we didn't select.

But what we did decide was to try to do everything we could to leave all of the high-liability and the very necessary courses. We didn't want to touch any course that had anything to do with an officer getting any POST certificate, from basic through executive. And officer safety, of course, was an issue.

And the bigger contracts that we have, actually, are things like the simulator contracts. But those are perishable skills contracts, and they are required for part of your CPT.

So we looked at what was required and our expectations, and the ease of agencies meeting their CPT requirements.

So to answer your question, yes, we did have several other alternatives. And I didn't throw those away, if you're interested in seeing what those are at some point in time, or if you want us to report back on those.

And so in the interest of keeping our material as brief as possible for this meeting, we didn't throw those on the table. But we could resurrect those, if you want. But all of those had -- they all had tendrils. No matter who we reduce, somebody has a reason why it's not a good idea.

Every class that we do is important to someone, and 1 2 we know that. And so we picked the ones that we thought for 15, for 18 months, we could plan around and there 3 could be alternatives. 4 5 And also, Commissioner, just so you know, every single call or every single e-mail that we got, we 6 7 personally returned. And we didn't e-mail people; we 8 called them. I personally called almost everybody who 9 had a problem or wanted to ask questions about how this 10 was going to work: "How am I going to meet my CPT if 11 we do this?" And we'll continue to do that. 12 COMMISSIONER DOYLE: And the second question I have 13 is, if -- say, you realize more savings. I mean, is 14 there a plan about what that goes back into? Or is that 15 just going to be added to the reserve? 16 MR. STRESAK: Thank you. 17 And I need to emphasize the point that I remain 18 guided by the direction of this Commission on these 19 issues. 20 To answer your question, this will remain scalable. 21 As we look and monitor, we will try to adjust 22 accordingly; and where we can restore programs back to 23 their full status, we'll do so. 24 We had to kind of triage this in a way, and look 25 at our core values, and what issues remain of core

The Basic Academy was one, because 1 significance to us. 2 from that, stems all our work and all your resources. 3 And so any programs that support the basic course 4 were left intact. Any officer safety high-liability courses were left intact. Mandatory training was left 5 intact. And instructor quality, programs that support 6 7 instructor quality were left intact. 8 And as Dick alluded to, at the same time, we have 9 to kind of maintain our organization, keep that afloat, 10 and as we're dealing with the POST testing system that 11 was spawned from the Rio Honda incident that you're 12 familiar with and the technology supporting those issues. 13 So we had to strike a balance between all of those 14 issues. 15 But those were our core values that guided us in trying to select which programs we pare down. 16 17 In some cases, programs aren't eliminated 18 completely. We've made an attempt to perhaps reduce 19 the number of presentations versus ask for a 10 percent 20 reduction in a course. So we're working with all our 21 presenters on that issue. 22 Yes, sir? 23 MR. REED: One other point I would mention also, we -- on the 18<sup>th</sup>, I believe it was -- we posted an 24 25 FAQ sheet. We took all the questions that we got from

the field, and we developed a four-page FAQ. And it's on the Web site now.

And one of the questions that was addressed was, in the event -- as you're alluding to, if there's an overcorrection, and we find, for instance, at this time next year that we've already started to accrue the savings and that we're in better shape than we think we are, in the FAQ sheet, we allude to the fact that the Executive Director will then come to the Commission and get approval for us to maybe start releasing something back.

It would be very easy if we get in a situation where we're a few million dollars ahead, to turn backfill right back on, depending on how much extra we found.

So that is in the FAQs. The field has been notified of that.

MR. STRESAK: And if I could make one more comment on this.

If you remember, during the major cheating scandal in Southern California, one of the by-products of that was an opportunity. An opportunity to look at our internal processes, look at our internal testing, and our security protocols. And we emerged from that a stronger and more effective organization, and moving towards a better, secure solution for testing.

Reed, Assistant Executive Director, Commission 1 2 on POST, expressing appreciation for his many years of 3 service to POST, and from the law enforcement community, 4 congratulating him on his retirement. 5 Old Business? COMMISSIONER SOBEK: Mr. Chair? 6 CHAIR KURYLOWICZ: Yes, sir. 7 8 COMMISSIONER SOBEK: One more thing that we have to 9 do regarding legislation. R.C. SMITH: Good morning. This is a really exciting program that POST has been involved with for several years.

I'm sorry that Greg Kyritsis, the consultant who is heading the program up, can't be here to give this presentation himself. He has really been the heart and soul behind POST's efforts in this program.

Basically, the POST Career Pipeline recognizes that we are looking forward to a tidal wave of law-enforcement retirements over the next few years. And at the same time, the report we hear from agencies throughout California is that their law-enforcement, police-officer, deputy-sheriff candidates, once they get into the background portion of that process, are failing at a record rate. It is very difficult to find qualified candidates to fill these pending vacancies that agencies are facing.

Starting at the high-school level isn't sufficient, because the young people have already made bad choices. They've made bad choices that are going to disqualify them for a law-enforcement career.

So the Career Pipeline concept is looking at elementary school children to basically prepare them for service in public safety. It's founded in a partnership between school districts, law enforcement,

the fire service, tailored to each individual community, 1 2 bringing in the business community, chambers of commerce, community colleges, police athletic leagues, and the 3 4 like. 5 And these stakeholders, these partners serve as advisory councils to these different school models. 6 7 The Pipeline represents the very school models that are all adaptive to the career technical education 8 9 programs as defined by the Department of Education. 10 Several of them are being run so far in the state 11 that are part of the Career Pipeline Program. 12 a charter school program with San Bernardino, magnet 13 schools that LAPD are running, the alternative school of 14 choice at Fairfield-Suisun Public Safety Academy --15 which I'm going to talk about a little bit more -- and 16 after-school cadet programs in elementary schools in 17 Anaheim. 18 The Fairfield-Suisun Public Safety Academy is 19 where we're going to hold a POST special seminar on November  $13^{th}$ , and in I believe it's Tab L -- am I 20 correct? -- there is an invitation flyer in there for 21 members of the Commission. 22 23 If you find this interesting, we would certainly invite you all to come. We have a chance to highlight 24 25 this program.

The Fairfield program, in particular, had a 1 2 remarkable success. It opened just last year, with 3 400 students in grades five through eight. 4 In their first year of being there, they received 5 an annual performance index score of 940, which is exceptional. Anything over 800 is considered to be, you 6 7 know, in that gold standard for a school. That puts them 8 in the top percentile statewide. 9 57 percent of these students come from disadvantaged 10 homes, and qualify for free and reduced-cost meals. 11 This year, they're starting with 500 students. And 12 literally the community is banging down the door, wanting 13 to enroll their kids in this successful program. 14 The feedback we get from the teachers is that "Hey, 15 I can be a teacher. I don't have to be a disciplinarian. I can actually focus on what I got into the teaching 16 17 profession for." 18 One of the, I think, the foundations of success are 19 that we've -- utilizing a program that promotes positive 20 character development, with the Character Counts program 21 from the Michael Josephson Institute of Ethics. And Mr. Josephson will be there at this November 13th event 22 23 to speak to how his program is incorporated into this 24 public-safety academy. 25 So, again, the information is up there. It's in
