14. Describe the individual's or organization's purpose and training responsibility.

Mr. Galli has been teaching law enforcement audiences since 1985, including POST courses. He has specialized in Search Warrants (S/W), Search & Seizure (S&S), Asset Forfeiture (AF), Criminal Case Filing, and Law Enforcement-Prosecutor Relations. Currently, he is the primary instructor for the Search Warrant block of the ICI Core Investigations Course presented by SBPSRT, and has been the lead instructor for this topic for the last 14-years. Additionally, he volunteers his time on numerous occassions per year providing instruction to various law enforcement agencies throughout Northern California, the California Narcotic Officers' Association (CNOA), the California District Attorneys' Association (CDAA), numerous District Attorney Offices throughout Northern California, and various civic groups.

Over the last 2-years, Mr. Galli has both directly and indirectly assisted POST in various curriculm development projects for POST's ICI Core Course, and the Major Drug Investigations Course, regarding S/W, S&S, and Defese Attorney Tactics. His efforts have enabled POST to completely update their curriculm for these courses, enhancing the quality, content, and professionalism of the product POST delivers to the public via detailed training courses to law enforcement.

15. Describe the nominee's overall achievement.

Mr. Galli has directly trained over 5,000 law enforcement officers over the course of his selfless efforts of nearly 40-years, to constantly ensure law enforcement has the most current information on evolving laws and Constitutional requirements. This has an immeasureable benefit to the public, through its effect of producing superior quality law enforcement and community service.

Moreover, and specifically as it applies to S/W and S&S, the physical safety of the public and law enforcement officers improves with the knowledge he provides which minimizes violent confrontations.

a) Innovation

Mr. Galli took it upon himself to fully research, write, and publish the most current California Search Warrant Manual, and he updates the manual with new additions every 18-months. He does this at his own expense and receives no compensation for his efforts. Further, he researches, writes, and publishes a Search and Seizure Manual (search warrant exceptions) for all law enforcement and prosecutors alike.

b) Impact

Mr. Galli's impact is best exemplified by the fact that in everyone of his classes he provides the law enforcement audience with his personal contact information, and sincerely solicits each student to reach out to him at anytime of the day or night with any questions on S/Ws, S&S, or any other topic the officer believes Mr. Galli could be of assistance. Although he gets contacted hundreds of times per year over the last 25-years, a noteworthy example was a 2:30am telephone call he received from a San Jose PD Vice SGT. The SGT was in the middle of a muti-pound PCP investigation when a very sensitive S&S issue arose. The SGT's description of the telephone call with Mr. Galli included the observation that when Mr. Galli answered this late night call, he sounded wide awake, and he was still working. He was supporting another investigation team with S/W drafting. Mr. Galli, while typing a warrant for this other investition team, fielded the SGT's unique S&S circumstanses. The SGT noted that Mr. Galli: "...always avails himself to his students and all law enforcement, at all hours, and always with an upbeat and supportive disposition."

Of note, Mr. Galli has personally written over 2200 search warrants for law enforcement officers throughout the bay area.

c) Reputation/Recognition

Mr. Galli has been recognized and has received numerous awards for his tireless efforts to assist in the training and development of law enforcement. His recent award from CNOA specifically complimented Mr. Galli's decades-long commitment to POST and law enforcement training.


